

## "What are Industrial Forest Practices Costing Us? The Climate and Societal Costs of Logging"

Renowned economists Ernie Niemi, Dr. John Talberth, and Dr. Kate Anderson gave presentations about the detrimental effects on climate of industrial forestry practices and the economic imperative of moving away from these practices towards available alternatives. There are hard-dollar costs from logging, but there are also climate and societal costs affecting us all. Specifically, what are they and what can we do about it?

#### Speakers:

Ernie Niemi, who spoke this summer with the NCCWP community about "The Truth about the Economics of Logging," helped establish the Forest Carbon Coalition in 2013 and has co-directed the Coalition since 2019 with John Talberth. He currently is President of Natural Resource Economics, a consultancy located in Eugene, Oregon. For 40 years he has helped communities in the U.S. and other countries understand the economic costs imposed on them by actions that degrade forests and other ecosystems and provided guidance for their efforts to halt these actions or secure compensation for the harms. He also has helped communities understand and pursue the economic benefits that they and future generations might enjoy from conservation or restoration of these ecosystems. Ernie holds a Masters in Urban and Regional Planning from Harvard University.

**Kathryn (Kate) Anderson** leads the Farms & Forests research program at Sightline Institute. She has a Ph.D. in Sociology, a Ph.D. in Environment & Resources, and a M.S. in Agricultural and Applied Economics. Kate is an expert on institutional tools that jointly promote vibrant rural communities and environmental sustainability. She has researched climate, biodiversity, water, and land use for the NSF Long-Term Ecological Research Program, the United Nations Development Program, and the Brazilian Government.

**John Talberth** is President and Senior Economist at Center for Sustainable Economy (CSE), an environmental economics think tank based in Portland, Oregon, and co-director of the Forest Carbon Coalition. He focuses his work on forest carbon policy analysis and advocacy based on the underlying science and economics. His environmental economics career began

by working to protect ancient forests of the Pacific Northwest in the late 1980s through CSE's predecessor, Forest Conservation Council, which he directed. John holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of New Mexico and a Masters in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Oregon.
